

ACGC PRESIDENT'S REPORT

The cumulative and long-lasting effects of the COVID-19 pandemic on higher education practices, combined with the continued growth of genetic counseling graduate programs, has kept ACGC busy during 2022. We supported a total of 56 graduate programs during the accreditation process by the end of the year, streamlined many accreditation applications and forms, and enhanced volunteer training to support the anticipated growth that we are expecting in 2023 and beyond.

Successful accreditation requires teamwork, dedication, and commitment by program leadership and faculty, volunteer peer-reviewers, and Board members to ensure that compliance with Standards are achieved in a way that promotes excellence and innovation. We thank our program leadership, faculty, and current students for their understanding and commitment to the Standards and related accreditation processes. We also have focused much of our recent efforts on understanding how to meet the needs of our key stakeholder communities, while being strategic about organizational sources. Our 2022 key accomplishments demonstrate this strategic mindset, including:

- Launched a new, mobile-response website with enhanced user experience features, in addition to a frequently used forms section and an interactive program map.
- Held a public comment period for feedback on the revised Practice-Based Competencies (PBCs).
- Held a public comment period for feedback on the Diversity, Equity, Inclusion, and Justice (DEIJ) Standards Revision.
- Successfully recruited and onboarded new ACGC volunteers for several standing committee positions, including Nominating, DEIJ, Communications, and Program Review Committee.
- Launched the new standing Diversity, Equity, Inclusion, and Justice (DEIJ) Committee based on 2021 recommendations from the Diversity Taskforce. Inaugural committee members are charged with helping to design and establish committee priorities.

ACGC is incredibly thankful for the dedication and commitment demonstrated by our wonderful team of Program Review Committee (PRC), Taskforce, and Standing Committee members. We also thank the members of the Board who volunteer their time and expertise to lead our organization through continuous growth and expansion and our Executive Office who provide us support and guidance every step of the way.

We have ambitious goals for 2023 and look forward to continued collaboration with the genetic counseling community to help us achieve these together.



COVID-19 GUIDANCE

ACGC will be allowing the accommodations related to the COVID-19 pandemic to expire on **June 15**, **2023**, in line with the United States Department of Education (USDE), the Council on Higher Education Accreditation (CHEA), and other accreditation organizations regarding COVID-19 exceptions. The original expiration date of May 15, 2023 has been extended to account for consistency with reporting on the Report of Current Status due **June 2023**. Programs will be expected to be compliant with relevant standards including Fieldwork Supervisors (A2.6.1), Curriculum Instruction (B1.4), and Fieldwork Training (B3.1.2) at that time.

• Fieldwork Supervisors (A2.6.1) Board certified genetic counselors with less than one year of experience and board-certified medical geneticists will be accepted as individuals capable of supervising students for their required 50 participatory cases with the condition that supervisors with less than one year of experience have a mentorship relationship with a genetic counselor/medical geneticist with supervision experience.

• Curriculum Instruction (B1.4) Programs should continue to follow their institution's guidelines/policies regarding course instructional delivery methods (e.g., hybrid, distance enhanced, or distance learning). No notification is required to ACGC for a temporary instructional delivery change. If the Program plans for permanent instructional delivery changes affecting more than 10% of the curriculum, a substantive change request must be submitted to ACGC.

• Fieldwork Training (B3.1.2) ACGC expects compliance. If a program anticipates that they will be noncompliant with this Standard, a request for variance is required with the fee assigned waived if this is directly tied to COVID-19 impacts.

PRACTICE-BASED COMPETENCIES REVIEW

The Practice-Based Competencies for Genetic Counselors form the basis for educational outcomes in graduate genetic counselor education. They are designed to reflect competencies that genetic counselors are expected to achieve by the completion of their graduate program.

A task force was established and began work in 2020 for the purpose of completing a systematic, comprehensive review of the current Practice-Based Competencies (PBCs). The task force is made up of genetic counselor leaders in varied clinical specialties, a medical geneticist, laboratorian, and education expert. Task force members are also active members ABGC, AGCPD, CAGC, and NSGC.

Using the universal developmental model as a framework, a revised version of the existing PBCs was presented to the ACGC Board of Directors in February 2022. The Board of Directors provided general support and feedback for the initial draft. In the fall of 2022, a public comment period allowed the genetic counseling community at large to provide stakeholder feedback regarding the content and organization of the PBCs.

The PBC Task Force worked diligently during the winter months of 2022 to address feedback from the ACGC BOD and the public comments; they also incorporated a request from the NSGC to revise wording related to ordering of genetic tests into their revisions. Intended goals for this revision included decreasing the number of overall competencies, ensuring the competencies were appropriate for entry-level genetic counselors, designing each competency to be measurable, and focusing on higher-level knowledge.

Having achieved these goals with the latest revisions, led by Leslie Cohen, has created a format that is visually comprehensive. Additionally, the Task Force has created a format that is visually comprehensible and allows for enhanced readability. Continued work to develop companion documents, such as a description of the developmental framework and a glossary of terms, will occur as the ACGC Board of Directors conducts their review and considers an implementation timeline and procedure.




ACGC STANDARDS

The goal of the ACGC Standards Committee is to monitor, evaluate and make recommendations to the ACGC Board for revision of the Standards of Accreditation. In 2021, the ACGC Diversity Taskforce recommended revisions to the existing standards. In order to integrate these recommendations in a timely fashion, the Standards Committee was charged with incorporating them in an off-cycle 2022 Standards revision.

To accomplish this, the Standards Committee members individually reviewed the standards by section with attention to inclusive language and the ACGC Diversity Taskforce recommendations. Individual responses were combined and reviewed during a series of team meetings until consensus was reached. The recommended revisions were presented to the ACGC Board in August 2022 and were circulated for public comment in November and December 2022. The Standards Committee is currently in the process of making further revisions based upon the public comment, consulting with the newly formed Diversity, Equity, Inclusion, and Justice Committee as needed throughout this process.

We anticipate the revised Standards will be released with an accompanying Frequently Asked Questions document. The public will be invited to comment on existing Standards during the next full revision.

DISTANCE EDUCATION

The Accreditation Council for Genetic Counseling (ACGC) is considering adding language to standards – or creating standards – that specifically address distance education. The rationale is that distance education, in varied forms, is becoming common practice across programs, and the current standards do not examine, for example, the institutional support and faculty training in order to provide quality distance education. Moreover, there is potential that some current standards may not apply to a distance education program thereby placing such a program at risk for noncompliance, inadvertently.


